TORONTO WELCOMES HOME 40TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE JUNO AWARDS

NEW JUNO statuette and All-NEW celebrations of Canadian music...fashion...art...and everything in between!

40th Anniversary commemorative book "Music from Far and Wide..." goes on sale November 9th!

Toronto, ON (October 26, 2010) – Ruby anniversary celebrations and revelry took place in Toronto, ON, tonight as hundreds from the music industry packed the historic venue of St. Lawrence Hall – site of the first JUNO Awards in 1970 – to officially usher in the 2011 JUNO Awards. The Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (CARAS) is celebrating two-fold: Canada's Music Awards are turning 40, and returning home to its city of origin!

A stunning new crystal statuette for the 2011 JUNO Awards was unveiled alongside announcements of 40th Anniversary events taking place place across the city. Tonight also marked the official book launch of "Music from Far and Wide: Celebrating 40 Years of the JUNO Awards" published by Key Porter Books, which goes on sale in bookstores nationwide starting November 9.

"The JUNO Awards are a constantly evolving celebration. This year we're truly enhancing the entertainment experience by offering all-new engaging events celebrating Canadian music 365 days of the year," said Melanie Berry, President & CEO of CARAS. "Tonight has been 40 years in the making, 40 years of celebrating the strength and diversity of our rich musical heritage and artists, and 40 years of bringing Canadian music closer to the fans."

The 40th Anniversary celebrations culminated with a retrospective showcase of seven previous JUNO Awards statuettes, dating back to the original 1970 Gold Leaf Award. Special guests including seven-time JUNO Award winners, Billy Talent, and long-time JUNO Award designer and creator Shirley Elford, were on hand to help reveal the newest 2011 JUNO Award design honouring the 40th Anniversary.

Since CTV joined forces with CARAS in 2001, The JUNO Awards has traveled across Canada from one coast to the other and back again, bringing a live, electrified stadium show to millions of Canadians locally and in homes across the country. First broadcast live on CTV from St. John's in 2002, CARAS and CTV have brought The JUNO Awards to Ottawa (2003), Edmonton (2004), Winnipeg (2005), Halifax (2006), Saskatoon (2007), Calgary (2008), Vancouver (2009) and St. John's again in 2010. The 2011 JUNO Awards, to air live from Toronto's Air Canada Centre on Sunday, March 27, marks the 10th anniversary broadcast of Canada's Music Awards on CTV.

JUNO Week takes place **March 21-27, 2011** and will encompass a spectacular programme of events spanning all art forms from music, fashion, art, literature and much more – planned by CARAS and the 2011 Toronto Advisory Committee, chaired by Gary Slaight, President & CEO of Slaight Communications. Signature JUNO Week events are also scheduled to take place including Juno Cup, JunoFest, Juno Fan Fare and Songwriters' Circle.
