Five years later she's the front-runner for Oscar glory thanks to a knockout performance in a Best Picture-nominated film, directed by a Hollywood legend. Swank transformed herself physically for the role of a hungry young boxer, training for hours each day and adding 19lbs of muscle to her slender frame. But it's the



humanity behind the physicality that makes this film connect with audiences—and Academy members. She's already scooped up a Golden Globe for the role as well as a Screen Actors Guild nomination. Her second Oscar might not be far behind.

t's time for a rematch. Annette Bening was favored to win an Oscar for her role in American Beauty at the 2000 Academy Awards, but the statuette was scooped by newcomer Hilary Swank for her role in

Boys Don't Cry. Bening's already won a Golden Globe (in the Musical/Comedy category) this year for her tourde-force performance as a theatrical diva of "a certain age" who's rejuvenated by an affair with a younger man. She's also been nominated by the Screen Actors Guild for the performance. Bening has a history with Oscar in additon to her American Beauty accolade, she was nominated for her supporting role in *The Grifters*.



Catalina Sandino Moreno

Maria Full of Grace

n anonymous admirer discovered Catalina Sandino Moreno auditioning for a theater role and sent her name to the Maria Full of Grace casting director. As the title character,

Moreno's Maria agrees to be a mule and carry drugs into the U.S. She knows she's being exploited, but turns the situation into an opportunity. Like her character, Moreno believes in making her own opportunities. "In Colombia, you live with your parents until you're 25, get a job and then get married. Now, I'm living in New York. It's changed my point of view on everything." An Oscar nod will change things even more.



Vera Drake

melda Staunton as Vera Drake is a working class wife, a loving mother and a woman devoted to helping others. She's also a woman with a secret. The film is set in 1950s London, at a time when abor-



tion was illegal, and Staunton's role is as complex as the subject it deals with. It's a part that's already brought her critical acclaim, including a Golden Globe nomination. However, this is Staunton's first nod from Oscar a fact that's unlikely to faze the seasoned British actress. Staunton once said, "People say to me, 'Oh, but surely you wanted to be a big film star when you were 21?' My answer is no, because I would've been rubbish."



Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind

ate Winslet plays against type in this gem of a film. It's no period piece, and there's not one corset in sight. Instead, Winslet plays the free-spirited, blue-haired,



impulsive Clementine alongside Jim Carrey's straightlaced Joel. While Eternal Sunshine was released early in 2004, Winslet's performance was memorable enough to snag a Golden Globe nomination and a SAG award nomination. Winslet's had her share of Academy Award nominations—for her leading role in Titanic and supporting roles in Sense and Sensibility and Iris—but an Oscar win has proved elusive, so far.

he first stunned us with her riveting performance as a Lolita-ish assassin-in-training in Leon: The Professional when she was only 13 years old and quickly rose to stardom as Queen Amidala in the Star Wars series. In Closer, based on the Patrick Marber play, she plays the vulnerable Alice, a stripper who becomes entangled in a four-handed game of deception and betrayal. Although her nude scenes were left on the cutting-room floor, the compelling role has Hollywood buzzing about Portman's emergence



as a more mature, more sexually evolved actress. And having just won the Best Supporting Actress honor at the Golden Globes, the young beauty has stacked the cards in her favor at the Oscars.

Cate Blanchett The Aviator

ussie actress Cate Blanchett is quickly becoming one of Hollywood's favorite leading ladies. Her Oscar nod for her portrayal of screen icon Katharine Hepburn in *The Aviator* is her

second. The Aviator follows the bizarre life of billionaireindustrialist Howard Hughes, who once dated Hepburn. Of her role, Blanchett says, "I'm trying to represent somebody in the same medium in which they were iconic, in which the audience rightly feels they have a sense of ownership of her screen persona." The Oscars have a history of honoring real-life performances, perhaps giving Blanchett an edge when the envelope is opened.



Virginia Madsen

Sideways

fter years of starring in straight-to-video titles like Full Disclosure, Virginia Madsen has finally put herself squarely on Hollywood's radar, managing to be this year's sleeper contender. Madsen

has picked a winner with the romantic drama Sideways, a film in which two men (Thomas Haden Church and Paul Giamatti) ponder their lives and relationships. Enter Maya, a wine-savvy waitress who wins the affections of Giamatti's shlubby writer. The way Madsen conveys her worn-by-life brand of tough and tender, and the scene where her discussion of wine becomes a metaphor for life, is a ready-made Oscar moment.



Laura Linney

Kinsey

t appears that Linney has left her gorilla-fighting career days of Congo behind her and is finally emerging as one of Hollywood's top actressesgranted, one who audiences seem to "discover" every cou-



ple of years: In 2000, she was nominated for Best Actress for You Can Count On Me. Linney now returns as a nominee for her role as Clara Kinsey, the wife of controversial sexologist Alfred Kinsey. It's a uniquely provocative role that required her to play a highly sexual character without being overtly sexy. Linney says of the role, "She was really a remarkable human being, and I loved seeing the world through her eyes."

Sophie Okonedo

Hotel Rwanda

his may be one of the most important roles British actress Sophie Okonedo will ever play. Playing Tatiana Rusesabagina in Hotel Rwanda has garnered the actress critical acclaim and her first Oscar



nom. The must-see film tells the horrific real-life story of Paul Rusesabagina and his courageous efforts against the devastation of the Rwandan genocide 10 years ago. Together they sheltered more than 1,000 refugees in the posh hotel he managed. "When I first read the script I was gripped," Okonedo says of her role. "It says a lot about the human spirit, living in a traumatic situation, and says a lot about love."

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Jamie Foxx

Ray

itting on Top of the World" and "They're Crazy About Me." Two Ray Charles songs that are at the top of double-Oscar nominee Jamie Foxx's playlist right now. Foxx used to be a Martin Lawrence wannabe, but he began testing his dramatic chops with small roles in films like *Ali*. Last year, he made the leap from *In Living Color* to livin' large as the newest member of Hollywood's A-List. First, there's *Collateral* (which earned him a Best Supporting nod). Then, he slipped on the shades, learned the walk, found the voice and be-



came the late music great Ray Charles in *Ray*. He's already won the Golden Globe, and if there's anything close to a coronation at this year's Oscars, it's Foxx for this role (unless it's Foxx for *Collateral*). Now that's something to sing about.

Don Cheadle Hotel Rwanda

If Don Cheadle played probasketball, he'd be the sixth man on the team, brought in off the bench to spark an offensive push late in the quarter. But after years of making other actors look better (Boogie Nights,

Out of Sight, Traffic), Cheadle has finally cracked the starting lineup with Hotel Rwanda, his first true leadingman role. Based on a true story, Cheadle plays Paul Rusesabagina, who turned the hotel he managed into a shelter for thousands of refugees fleeing the Rwandan genocide in 1994 when close to a million people were killed over the course of just 100 days. It's a powerful performance in a powerful film.



Leonardo DiCaprio The Aviator

t's been ten years since Leo DiCaprio exploded onto movie screens with an Oscarnominated performance in What's Eating Gilbert Grape. And for a while there, DiCaprio's career was adrift in

the shadow of one very big, billion-dollar-earning boat— *Titanic*'s wake carried with it fame, fortune and teen-idol worship, but little in the way of creative fulfilment. That is until this DiCaprio passion project reteamed the actor with director Martin Scorsese. DiCaprio plays Howard Hughes, the pilot, playboy, movie mogul and madman who broke flying records, bedded movie stars and helped shape the Golden Age of Hollywood.




It's hard to believe that Johnny Depp has never won an Academy Award. His firstever nomination was just a year ago (and it took a rather dandy swashbuckling Keith Richards impression to get the



Academy's attention, at that). This time out, Depp earns the accolade for his portrayal of Scottish author J.M. Barrie, who wrote *Peter Pan*. "It's truly a work of genius," he says of *Pan*. "It's a masterpiece of imagination, and the result of the most remarkable inspiration. It's one of those rare perfect things in the world that will always be with us, and this was a wonderful opportunity to explore where such a powerful story might have come from."



ong before he was *The Man With No Name*, Clint Eastwood was literally a man with no name—his movie debut in 1955's *Revenge of the Creature* was uncredited. But 55 films later, Eastwood has



become easily identified with many characters moviegoers won't soon forget. The latest is Frankie Dunn in *Million Dollar Baby*, which Eastwood also directed. Dunn is a broken-down boxing trainer with one good fight left in him, who reluctantly trains a woman to become the world champion. Eastwood's performance, as raw and powerful as any he's given, has earned him his second nod in this category (his first was for *Unforgiven*).

Collateral

his is definitely Jamie Foxx's year. The actor has already won a Golden Globe for his portrayal of Ray Charles in *Ray* and is a top contender in two Oscar categories (see **Best Actor**). In *Collateral*, Foxx takes a break from his typical comedic roles to play taxi driver Max, whose mundane job turns into a nightmare when contract killer Vincent (Tom Cruise) climbs into his cab. Vincent forces Max to drive him to each assignment—making him an unwilling accomplice. Of the Oscar buzz, Foxx says, "A lot of people say 'Don't say Oscar.' But



I say, 'say it!' If you're playing basketball, you want to go to the championship. In our business, the Oscars are considered the championship. When you get LA buzzing and other people are acknowledging your work, that is when it feels good."

Alan Alda The Aviator

Veryone always thinks of Alan Alda as a nice guy. Eleven years on a TV sitcom will do that. But he certainly seems to relish the opportunity to play darker characters, and his Oscar-nominated turn

as the nefarious Sen. Owen Brewster, in *The Aviator*, is no exception. His first-ever Oscar nod, Alda plays one of the powerful men who tried to bring down Howard Hughes with a very public investigation. Alda says, "We'd all like to be ruthless once in a while. It was fun to be able to go in and spend the whole day just being ruthless." And it's probably smart to keep in mind that sometimes it pays to be bad.



Morgan Freeman Million Dollar Baby

This is the fourth Oscar nomination of Freeman's career. The veteran actor, who was previously nominated for *The Shawshank Redemption, Driving Miss Daisy* and *Street Smart*, hits

the Oscar forefront in *Million Dollar Baby*. In the latest Clint Eastwood-directed film, Freeman delivers a stunning performance as Eddie "Scrap-Iron" Depris, a fighter forced to quit boxing after he went blind in one eye. He and fight trainer Dunn (Eastwood) take female boxer Maggie Fitzgerald (Hilary Swank) under their wing, and Freeman brings an easy charm and moral steadiness to his performance.



You may remember him from TV's Wings or the short-lived Ned and Stacey, co-starring Debra Messing. But who would ever have expected the small-screen funny-



man to draw so much attention for a role in the top indie film of the year? In *Sideways*, Church plays Jack, an out-of-work actor who decides to have a prenuptial romp during a wine-tasting trip with his pal, Miles "I've been offered several movies since [*Sideways*], but I didn't want to do any of them. If this is the last thing [that I do], that would be all right. I have no problem with *Sideways* as the movie I become known for."



Closer

This is Clive Owen's first Oscar nomination. But it's no surprise that the talented Brit is getting a nod for his role in *Closer*, given that he took home the Golden Globe for the same role. The drama, which



also stars Julia Roberts, Jude Law and Natalie Portman, is based on the Patrick Marber stage play about passion, seduction, betrayal and the outright pain that couples put each other through. Says the 40-year-old Owen, who also starred in 2004's *King Arthur*, "It's just lovely to be involved in a movie that goes back to basics. It's very unusual to hear fantastic dialogue, to hear intelligent people interacting."

The Aviator

oward Hughes was an eccentric billionaire. He made big, expensive, flashy movies, flew big, expensive, flashy airplanes and dated big, expensive, flashy movie stars. Chances are Hughes would've liked this movie about him: It's big, expensive, flashy and full of stars, from Leonardo DiCaprio as Hughes to Cate Blanchett as Katharine Hepburn. Directed by perennial Oscar bridesmaid Martin Scorsese (Goodfellas), this Golden Globe winner is a sweeping Old Hollywoodstyle epic. Hughes pushed the limits as a pilot (he set numerous speed records), as a filmmaker (he made films very much like *The Aviator*, only without the CGI and star power), and as a business tycoon (he battled Pan Am for airline supremacy). It's enough material for three TV miniseries, yet Scorsese squeezes it all into one Spruce Goose of a film. Scorsese and company even manage to offer occasional peeks at the hygienically challenged, lunatic germaphobe Hughes became later in life, when he took to wearing tissue boxes on his feet and storing his urine in milk bottles.



Finding Neverland

Title aside, this film has nothing to do with a certain creepy King of Pop. Instead, it's the story of *Peter Pan* author J.M. Barrie, a whimsical Victorian era drama sprinkled with fairy dust. Blending fantasy with heart-tugging sentimentality, *Finding Neverland* stars Johnny Depp as the playwright and author who never grew up and the delish Kate Winslet as the widowed mother of the actual "lost" boys who inspired Barrie's classic story. And while Depp and Winslet certainly captivate, it's the startlingly nuanced performance of 12-year-old Freddie Highmore as the real-life Peter who steals the show and your heart.



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Sideways

n the surface, it's a story about two middle-aged ne'er-do-wells on a California getaway in search of wine and women, which sort of sounds like an old episode of Frasier. But this Golden Globe winner is more a painful dramedy of errors than a laughtracked TV sitcom. The title refers both to the way wine bottles are stored and the way the two main characters go through life. Oscar nominee Paul Giamatti is Miles, a failed novelist with one failed marriage already on the books. Thomas Haden Church—Wings' dufus Lowell—is Jack, a never-quitemade-it movie actor intent on sowing some wild oats before his impending marriage. Enter Oscar nominee Virginia Madsen as Maya, a waitressing wine expert with a nose for romance, and the underrated Sandra Oh as Stephanie, a saucy vino vixen who breaks Jack's nose, if not his heart. There's a reason this is one of the bestreviewed films of '04: This vintage is a modern classic.



Million Dollar Baby

espite appearances, Million Dollar Baby isn't really a boxing movie. Under a layer of sweat and a pair of padded gloves is a story about what goes on outside the ring when three lost souls are faced with life's bigger questions. Sure, it has all the fixtures of a classic boxing movie—an underdog fighter with heart, a crusty old trainer ready to throw in the towel on life, bags being punched and ropes being skipped, pearls of fight wisdom that apply to real life and boxing bouts miraculously won. But Million Dollar Baby is about more than fighting the good fight. Starring Hilary Swank as a waitress with a mean left cross, director Clint Eastwood as her trainer, and Morgan Freeman as a former fighter who provides the film's moral compass, the movie tackles the kinds of challenges that can't be solved with "never say die" platitudes.

Ray

The life of music legend Ray Charles was ready-made for the movies. Growing up poor in the south, he learned to play piano at age 3, went blind at 7 and was an orphan at 15. He studied classical music in school and years later he pioneered soul music, a combination of blues and gospel that forever changed the sound of popular music. He won 12 Grammy awards and was hailed a "genius" by none other than Frank Sinatra. He loved heroin almost as much as he did women, and he did it all, as Sinatra was fond of saying, his way. Charles was indeed an American original. And under the steady hand of director Taylor Hackford and thanks to the studied performance of star Jamie Foxx, his story at last comes to the big screen, good, bad and ugly thankfully intact.






Martin Scorsese

The Aviator

artin Scorsese is widely considered to be the greatest living American director. He's easily the greatest never to have won an Oscar. Raging Bull? Nope. The Last Temptation of Christ? Uh-uh. Goodfellas? Lost to Kevin Costner. Gangs of New York? Struck out on all 10 of its nominations. Taxi Driver? Wasn't even nominated. But The Aviator could change that. It's Scorsese's fifth directing nom and the movie is ideal Oscar bait: A big, sweeping biography full of Old Hollywood flavor that explores the familiar Scorsese



territory of a good man in torment. *The Aviator* is up for 11 awards, including Leonardo DiCaprio for Best Actor for his portrayal of Howard Hughes. If Scorsese's Oscar drought isn't over, he'll join Alfred Hitchcock as a five-time bridesmaid.

Clint Eastwood Million Dollar Baby

hen Clint Eastwood attended the Oscars last year as a nominee for *Mystic River* he had no idea what his next movie would be. Now, remarkably, he's heading back as a triple-nominee—Best

Director, Best Actor and producer of a Best Picture contender—for this boxing drama, his 25th behind the camera. *MDB* is up for seven awards, including Best Actress (Hilary Swank), Best Supporting Actor (Morgan Freeman) and Best Adapted Screenplay (for Canuck Paul Haggis). Eastwood already has two Oscars, for directing and producing 1993's Best Picture, *Unforgiven*.



Mike Leigh Vera Drake

This provocative British filmmaker—known for his kitchen-sink films—earns his fourth and fifth Oscar nominations for writing and directing this period drama about a devoted working-class

mother who also helps young women terminate unwanted pregnancies at a time when abortion was illegal. Star Imelda Staunton is also nominated in the Best Actress category. Leigh, who is famous for constructing his scripts from improvised rehearsals with his actors, was previously nominated for writing and directing *Secrets & Lies* in 1997 and for writing *Topsy-Turvy* in 2000.



f the bunch, Taylor Hackford is the journeyman director. His filmography includes An Officer and a Gentleman, Against All Odds, The Devil's Advocate and Proof of Life. And it's really no sur-



prise that the man who made the documentary *Chuck Berry: Hail! Hail! Rock 'n' Roll*, about another black music legend, would choose to direct the biopic about the late Ray Charles. Hackford spent years trying to get funding to make this warts-and-all portrait and his efforts have finally paid off. But no one could have predicted that comic-turned-actor Jamie Foxx would give such an astoundingly convincing performance in the title role.




A lexander Payne has made just four films, a mere drop in the bucket compared to Eastwood or Scorsese, but already he's being touted as one of America's greatest directors. And this marks his second



Oscar nomination (he was nominated in the Best Adapted Screenplay category for 1999's *Election*). *Sideways* is vintage Payne: A character-driven dramedy about two middle-aged losers—Paul Giamatti's failed novelist and Thomas Haden Church's failed actor. Striking just the right balance of comedy and romance, with a hint of melancholy and a pinch of slapstick, Payne uncorks one of the finest films of this or any year.





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Shrek 2

his sequel to the Academy Award-winning Shrek is proof that animated films have been kicking live-action butt when it comes to ingenuity and laugh-'til-it-hurts wit. Even throw-away moments are made clever: In one tiny scene, Cinderella's step-sister, as voiced by Larry King, tends bar in a dump called the Poison Apple and offers tips on where to hire a hitman. It's those touches, plus the bang-on voice-over talents of Mike Myers (again in a thick Scottish brogue) as Shrek, Cameron Diaz as Fiona, Eddie Murphy as Donkey and Antonio Banderas as feline assassin Puss In Boots, that make this film as much of a winner as the original.



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

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Oscar on his mind

"They found a genius to play a genius." That's how *Ray*'s Kerry Washington describes Jamie Foxx, her co-star in the Ray Charles biopic. In this exclusive interview with *Tribute*'s Bonnie Laufer-Krebs, the *In Living Color* alum and classically trained pianist talks about bringing his "A" game to the legendary musician's life story, singing with Kevin Spacey and all that Oscar talk.

You made quite an impresion when *Ray* premiered at the Toronto International Film Festival...

J.F. I have to say this to Toronto: You guys are the best! The film festival was absolutely incredible. You guys have so much energy. I threw a party in Toronto and there were like 4,000 people who couldn't get in.

The big thrill for me was having Kevin Spacey there because he was premiering *Beyond the Sea* [his Bobby Darin biopic]. I brought him up on stage and he sang "Splish Splash." It was incredible. So we had the spirit of Bobby Darin and the spirit of Ray Charles on the stage at the same time. It was so cool!

How daunting was it for you, not only as an actor, but also as a musician, to play Ray Charles? J.F. You know, I was ready and I was up for the task, I thought. But when I got to meet Ray and work with him, we were playing the blues, going back and forth and I hit a wrong note and he stopped me and says, "Why the hell would you do that?" I was like, Huh? Hey, I'm sorry.



Ray would say, "The notes are right underneath your fingers, man." So at that point I started to understand more about the character of the man and that the music has to be perfect for him because his life is all about sound and the sound is the harmony, and if the harmony is off it's bad for him. So that was my testing ground and once I got it right he was like, "The kid's got it!"



Plus, getting his blessing—how amazing was that?

J.F. It's beautiful, can't top it. It's all about the moment. You know you're never going to be able to take all the money in the world with you, you can't take your house or any of that stuff with you, but it's the moments you can always go back to and say, "Man, I can remember that time with Ray." Even when Ray was passing away, he didn't want anybody to see him, so Quincy Jones made him a CD of moments when they hung out, when they met each other and how it was, and they just let that CD play next to Ray's bed and he just listened to his best friend talk as he walked off into the sunset.

What was it like spending time with Ray Charles?

J.F. The amazing thing about spending time with him is that you get it straight from him. It just blows your mind. When you meet him, it's the way he sat down, the way he ordered his food, the way he talked to people, you know, the way he got mad and internalized things. Those are the things you can pull from. And then when he felt comfortable, he really let



me in and told me about the drugs and about the women. It's definitely a rock-and-roll story. If you look at it, he was definitely rock-and-roll. He was hip-hop. He was everything. It was tragic, the adversities he had to go through. And the main thing was getting that nuance of him, just the quietness. It's the small things that really make you go beyond [the persona of] Ray Charles.

What was the hardest part about playing Ray?

J.F. Not being able to see was tough because I put the prosthetics on my eyes so that I really couldn't see a thing for 12 or 14 hours a day. It makes you think: What would you rather give up—your sight or your ability to hear? Most people say hearing because they want to see the colors or the mountains and they want to see the beauty of what the world has to offer. For Ray to have had that snatched from me every single day while I was making this, was tough. So I understand a person who is sentenced to that—it must be a tough thing for a person.

Everyone is buzzing about your Oscar nomination for this role. Is this intimidating or scary for you at all?

J.F. Scaring me? Oh no! Hey, I'm a grown man, nothing scares me! It's great and you know, this is what it's all about. I think it brings enthusiasm. [Director] Taylor Hackford and I are so enthused about this project, so for people to say that there is Oscar buzz around this movie—bring it on! It brings more attention to the movie and hopefully more people will come out and see it and that's a beautiful thing.





seeing how far I can go. It's a great thrill for me.

H.S. I trained four hours a day, six days a week for three months before I started filming. As we began shooting I kept training, and



I never broke my nose but it did get bruised pretty badly to the point where for two weeks I couldn't even touch it. But that's a part of it and it just got me deeper into character.

What was it like having Clint Eastwood not only as your co-star, but also as your director? H.S. It was a dream come true and that's the

What did you learn from him?

Sadly, Martin Scorsese has never won an Oscar. When he was nominated for *Raging Bull*—one of the greatest films ever made and the highlight of this collection—he lost to Robert Redford for *Ordinary People*. Ironically, he might lose this year to Clint Eastwood—who made a boxing movie. Even so, listening to director Martin Scorsese on any of the commentary tracks in this collection is like a master class in film appreciation. That these discs—*Raging Bull, New York, New York*, the lesser-known *Boxcar Bertha* and the concert doc *The Last*

Waltz—are loaded with extras only makes this even more necessary for the serious cinephile. Among the highlights: The two-disc Raging Bull Special Edition also commentracks with screenwriter Paul Schrader and boxer Jake LaMotta (whom Robert De Niro plays in the film), and no



fewer than six behind-the-scenes featurettes, while *The Last Waltz Special Edition* includes amazing footage of The Band, Bob Dylan, Eric Clapton, Joni Mitchell, Neil Young and others.

Want to win your Oscar pool? Consider these stats before you make your picks:


- The Producers Guild, which names its top producer (i.e. Best Picture) each year, has been in line with the Academy seven times in the past 10 years. This year their top prize went to *The Aviator*.
- The Directors Guild of America's choice for Best Director has matched the Academy's choice seven times in the past 10 years. Check out the DGA winner at www.dga.org after January 29th.
- In the past 10 years, the Screen Actors Guild's choices have predicted Oscar wins six times for Best Actor, seven for Best Actress and five each for Best Supporting Actor and Actress. Visit www.sagawards.com after February 5th for a list of SAG winners.
- Only three times in 76 years of Academy history has a film won Best Picture without also receiving a Best Director nomination. (Finding Neverland could fit that bill this year.)

- Oscar loves a chameleon. (Remember Charlize Theron last year in *Monster*?) This year, Hilary Swank gained 19lbs of muscle for *Million Dollar Baby* and Jamie Foxx *became* Ray Charles in *Ray*.
- The Academy has a thing for actors who portray real people. This year the bio list includes Leo DiCaprio as Howard Hughes, Cate Blanchett as Katharine Hepburn, Johnny Depp as J.M. Barrie Alan Alda as Sen. Owen Brewster, Don Cheadle as Paul Rusesabagina and Jamie Foxx as Ray Charles.
- The Golden Globes double their odds at matching Oscar's picks each year by including two Best Picture categories: Drama and Musical/Comedy. In the past 10 years, seven of their 10 Drama choices and two of their Musical/Comedy choices have gone on to win a Best Picture Oscar. This year, the Globes singled out *The Aviator* and *Sideways*.
